Thanks so much for considering a program with the "Inkless Experience." I think you and your students will find it a fun day — and educational, even if they don't know it.

Everything on Inkless Tales is designed with three things in mind:

- 1. The activities have to be fun. If they aren't fun, kids won't visit. I test nearly everything that's posted on real, actual kids hurts sometimes, but I always keep in mind: Inkless Tales has a global reach. I'm not there in Russia, sitting next to some child in Moscow. I don't want them to struggle over a game.
- 2. The stories, poems, games and projects have to have some pedagogical purpose. My philosophy is that learning is a lifetime pleasure, and this happens best when we learn to love learning early in life.
- My mother taught me in my own childhood that I could do absolutely anything, as long as I never gave up.

So what if I struck out the first few — or few hundred — times I tried? The only failure, she told me over and over again, was to give up. Until I gave up, all I was doing was ruling out what didn't work. (She came from a medical family, so perhaps that's where that came from, ha ha.)

Still, it was a valuable lesson, and one that stuck with me. There's talent, there's skill, there's luck, and there's perseverance. Of the four, sticking to it will gain you success every time. Plenty of talented cab drivers out there in Hollywood. Plenty of skilled people just scraping by. Plenty of people betting on the lottery. But the ones who succeed in doing what they really love? The ones who never quit on themselves.

That's why the banner across the front page of Inkless Tales reads: YOU CAN DO IT.




